# Kids 'N Care takes care of medical needs

Kids 'N Care Health Center strives to provide comprehensive and quality primary care to children in foster care in Duval County through partnership with the Florida Department of Children and Families, Family Support Services of North Florida, the Duval County Health Department, Children's Medical Services, and the University of Florida.

Comprehensive Health Assessments are offered for all children as they enter foster care. This includes a physical health evaluation, screening for developmental, educational, emotional/behavioral, vision, hearing and dental problems, as well as infectious disease exposure.

With access to Florida Shots, the statewide immunization database, Kids 'N Care can assess each child's immunization status and update them. As a result of this evaluation needed referrals to a dentist, eye doctor, developmental evaluations, and specialty evaluations can be made

Following the Comprehensive Health Assessment, they can continue to follow your foster child—offering well child checkups, sick visits, evaluations of chronic health problems such as asthma and chronic health problems as well.

An on-staff child psychiatrist can evaluate and treat children using Kids 'N Care for their primary care. Open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday - Friday (closed most Wednesday afternoons for training). Call (904) 359-3842 to schedule an appointment.

## Need a break?

If you need respite care from Family Support Services, please remember that there is a two-week notice required, unless you have an emergency. If you have a friend or a relative that is willing to help you out, he or she must get fingerprinted and have a background check run, but can be a back-up provider in your home for short periods of time. ## All Things Behavioral... Whining

A newborn cries. An adult stops the crying by giving food or comfort. Instantly, the newborn learns that one way to get attention is whining. Years later, having learned the lesson well, that person dashes off a letter that begins, "Dear Legislator ... I'm sick and tired of ...." Whining, it turns out, is a pretty useful way of getting what we want—if only it wasn't so irritating.

Here's how to help an irritating whiner become a constructive complainer. Recognize that some whining is just general irritation, for example, when a child is hungry. Avoid attending to tone of voice. What the child is saying might actually be reasonable, for example, "I'm hungry." Help the child speak in a way that will gain what the child wants. You might say to the child, "Say, 'I'm hungry,'" and model the proper tone of voice. When the child complies, provide a small snack. Later, you can teach acceptance of "no" and "wait."

## Summer Safety: Tips to keep children safe around water

Tips to keep your children safe around water at home, according to the American Association of Pediatricians.

Children must be watched by an adult at all times when in or near water. Children may drown in two inches of water. Stay within an arms length of your child around:

- Bathtubs, even with baby bathtub "supporting ring" devices;
- Buckets and pails, especially 5-gallon buckets and diaper pails;
- Ice chests with melted ice;
- Toilets;
- Hot tubs, spas and whirlpools;
- Irrigation ditches, post holes, and wells;
- Fish ponds, fountains.

### Other safety tips include:

- Emptying all buckets, pails and bathtubs after each use;
- Keep young children out of the bathroom unless they are closely watched;
- Teach others in the home to keep the bathroom door closed;
- Never leave a child alone in a bathtub or in the care of another child, even for a moment;
- Use a rigid, lockable cover on a hot tub, spa or whirlpool, or fence in all four sides as you would for a swimming pool;
- Set your water heater thermostat no higher than 120-degrees;
- Throw away or tightly cover water or chemical mixtures after use;
- Watch children closely when they are playing near wells, irrigation or drainage ditches. Fill in empty holes or have fences installed;
- Learn CPR and how to get emergency help.
